In May, twenty four residents attended a very informative evening at the village hall with the charity **Heartstart**. This had been arranged by the parish council following the installation of the defibrillator which had been funded by Malvern Hills Lions Club before the pandemic. The village hall trustees provided refreshments and everyone had the opportunity to practice lifesaving CPR. This was a very enjoyable evening and afterwards everyone said that they felt more confident to respond to an emergency should one arise.

#### **Guarlford Village Hall**

At the Annual General Meeting at the end of June, three more residents were elected to the role of trustee of the village hall. Heather Clarke, Phil Thomas and Andrea Candlish were all unanimously voted in, bringing the trustees now up to full strength with eight members. Jenny Cameron was re-elected as chairman; Gill Hollick continues as secretary and Judith Knott continues as treasurer.

The trustees will continue with fundraising activities as they work towards raising the  $\pm 150,000$  target needed for the regeneration of the village hall. So far,  $\pm 30,000$  has been raised. Come and join in some of the future events in the village hall. They are great fun and with everyone's help we can raise enough money to update our village hall for the 21st century.

We were away during the Jubilee celebrations at the Beauchamp, but we when got back we were given a souvenir mug specially made for the Beauchamp. Everyone enjoyed themselves at the celebrations despite the weather and it is nice to think that everyone was united in celebrating this fantastic milestone for



our Queen of 70 years. Though some of the people living at the Beauchamp can remember the coronation in 1953, others, like myself have never known a different monarch.



I attended the NHS big tea held in the Quadrangle to celebrate the **74th birthday of the NHS.** It was in aid of Herefordshire and Worcestershire Health and Care NHS Trust, which provides a range of physical and mental health services across the two counties from the community hospitals, mental health recovery units and within patients' homes. The afternoon was a success with most residents and lots of visitors coming out to enjoy tea and homemade cake in the almost sunshine. It did not rain on us so that was a blessing. Many of residents here at the Beauchamp have cause to be grateful to the NHS for their care over the years and wished to express their support. We raised £811.75.

Our new chaplain has been licenced with a service conducted in St Leonards by the Bishop of Dudley and is now living with us in the community. **Fr Iain Forbes** has come from Surrey to take over our pastoral care. He has already become a valued member of the community and presence in all our lives.

The mobile library is running again and visits the first Thursday in the month at 2.25pm, parked outside the Beauchamp Community. The van is packed full of books including the latest releases. With the reduction in bus services and the rising cost of petrol, I reflect that two years ago this month I was returning to work after furlough and petrol was 99p a litre. What a change in the last few weeks.

We await the blooming of the **catalpa tree**, which is always spectacular and worth seeing about two weeks to go. St Leonard's church was open to the public as part of the **Midsummer Malvern** celebration organised by Malvern Civic Society, an opportunity for others to enjoy this unusual and beautiful building. We visited Colwall Church on a wet and rainy Thursday evening, which I thoroughly enjoyed, having not been inside Colwall Church before.

It is with sadness that I note that Cora, the editor of the *Grapevine*, is retiring. She will be missed as the editor, and I wait with baited breath to see who will be taking over running the Grapevine.



#### Vicar's Blog

I have been getting to grips with the **Book of Ezra** over the last few days. It has been a bit of a struggle, especially with all the wonderfully sounding names of tribes and countries. The more I delve into the Book, the more I see parallels with modern society. See what I mean when I preach on the Parable of the Good Samaritan on Sunday:

When the adversaries of Judah and Benjamin heard that the returned exiles were building a temple to the Lord, the God of Israel, they approached Zerubbabel and the heads of families and said to them,

'Let us build with you, for we worship your God as you do, and we have been sacrificing to him ever since the days of King Esar-haddon of Assyria who brought us here.' But Zerubbabel, Jeshua, and the rest of the heads of families in Israel said to them, 'You shall have no part with us in building a house to our God; but we alone will build to the Lord, the God of Israel, as King Cyrus of Persia has commanded us.'

Then the people of the land discouraged the people of Judah, and made them afraid to build, and they bribed officials to frustrate their plan throughout the reign of King Cyrus of Persia and until the reign of King Darius of Persia....

In the reign of Ahasuerus, in his accession year, they wrote an accusation against the inhabitants of Judah and Jerusalem....and again in the days of Artaxerxes....who made an order that the people be made to cease, and that this city be not rebuilt..... At that time the work on the house of God in Jerusalem stopped and was discontinued until the second year of the reign of King Darius of Persia. (Verses from the Book of Ezra Chapter 4, New Revised Standard Version)

Heavenly Father, You take the long view whereas we only see the short-term. Help us to listen to You and take up the challenge to do Your work, and to say "No!" when an offer does not seem right. Teach us also to know that there will be others to pick up the baton and run with it if we falter or fail. Amen God stirred up the pagan king Cyrus to send the Jews who had originally been taken to Babylon back to their own land to rebuild the Temple in Jerusalem Although only a remnant returned, he also arranged to send back the silver and gold that had been ransacked some 70 years earlier. However, those returning were not particularly welcomed by those who had stayed. It was mostly the elite of the country that had been taken captive to Babylon. Those who were left were the poorest and lowliest of society. Over the years others had drifted in from Samaria - outsiders who were brought in by the Assyrians when the kingdom of Israel was captured. These people were very unhappy to see the people of Judah and Benjamin back in their ancestral lands.

Their first action was to offer to help rebuild the Temple, but those returning saw that for the Samaritans, Jehovah (God) was only one of a number of gods that they worshipped, and they refused the offer, despite what seemed like a good offer, and the fact they were vastly outnumbered. For the rest of Cyrus' reign and for two kings afterwards, they were opponents

causing Zerubbabel and Jeshua great difficulties, and it wasn't until the Persian king Darius came to the throne that God's plans continued.

When we answer God's call to action, it may not always succeed in the short term, but ultimately if we have faith in him and persevere all will be well. Every blessing to you all,

#### Lifepath 2022

Taking part in Lifepath 2022 was a wonderful experience. The top classes from three or four local primary schools arrived at Malvern Priory each morning with their teachers; some started their 'pilgrimage' by coming on foot. During the week, over 500 children were welcomed to the priory by **Pilgrim Guides** and flag-waving members of the team. In whole-group sessions, we all sang wonderful action songs, learned about the history of the priory, and watched a play based on the parable of the talents and the TV show, *The Apprentice*. Everyone loved it and laughed at the comedy, but also learned to recognise that we all have talents to be used and not buried.

On some days, we acted as Pilgrim Guides, taking a group of children and their teacher from one activity to another, and on other days as Activity Helpers. Each morning the whole team met together to get instructions for the day, and then one member shared a favourite passage of scripture and its impact on their path of life. These devotional talks were most encouraging.

The children enthusiastically took part in various activities relating to how life in the priory was in medieval times. This included the *Prayer Journey*, which we both helped with on different days. It was amazing to see how all the children were engaged in this activity, writing prayers of thanks, sorry and please, and learning about God's love through different mediums. This was such a peaceful place. At the debrief, after we had waved goodbye to the children, the children's prayers posted in boxes were anonymously offered up to God. We were also told about prayers brought during the day and challenges that had been faced and overcome.

We had such a great time, interacting with members of many churches in and around Malvern, all contributing to bringing the message of the love of God to the children. We both warmly applaud all the organisers - and without hesitation we recommend the experience to others.
